January - May 2021 Accomplishment Highlights - IDS Faculty Meeting

Announcements

- **Sujatha Srinivasan** and **David Fredricks** led the Fred Hutch portion of a collaboration that has officially named a new bacterium in honor of Fred Hutch. <u>A Fred Hutch News Story</u> announced that *Megasphaera hutchinsoni* is linked to bacterial vaginosis and higher HIV risk and was named in honor of the place where researchers first isolated it and in recognition of the Hutch's longstanding expertise in HIV research.
- **Josh Schiffer** and **Dan Reeves** are part of the team of researchers, working closely with the Washington Department of Health, that have created an <u>online tool</u> for modeling the COVID-19 pandemic in King County Washington. The interface provides policy makers with a contingent projection of SARS-CoV-2 based on 2 factors: social distancing and vaccination.
- Hans-Peter Kiem is scientific co-founder of Ensoma, a newly launched company expanding the curative power of genomic medicine by pioneering a next-generation in vivo approach. The company has launched with \$70 million in Series A financing to develop genome modification technologies via a single injection. Read the Ensoma press release
- Volunteer enrollment is underway at Harborview for a COVID-19 clinical trial led by site PI Anna Wald, evaluating an investigational, second-generation COVID-19 vaccine. The Phase 1 multicenter study will examine safety, tolerability, and immune response for different doses of a two-part, investigational COVID-19 vaccine regimen. The second stage of the study will include vaccines with multiple SARS-CoV-2 proteins, in addition to the components of Spike protein used in the current COVID-19 vaccines given under FDA Emergency Use Authorization. - Anna Wald is co-leading an investigational COVID-19 vaccine clinical trial that began volunteer enrollment in December 2020. The Phase III study will examine whether the Novavax vaccine candidate can protect against SARS-CoV-2, the coronavirus responsible for COVID-19. The trial is part of the NIH's newly established COVID-19 Prevention Network formed by NIAID. Read the full story from <u>UW Medicine Newsroom</u>.
- A new study—the Prevent COVID U study—led by Larry Corey, seeks to answer the question if vaccinated people can still become infected and spread COVID-19 to others. The study will offer the Moderna COVID-19 vaccine to 12,000 college students willing to swab their noses every day for four months during the course of the clinical trial. Answers from this new trial will likely signal whether the much-anticipated vaccines will usher in a return to life where people can safely congregate in crowded, indoor settings without fear, or if the era of masks and social distancing is likely to be with us for a long, long time.
